# Performing Arts Series Highlights

#### Coreyah

Coreyah, a six member band from South Korea, shared their music that breaks the barrier between traditional and contemporary popular Korean music by assimilating various world music heritages. In addition to the concert, the band hosted a workshop/ demonstration with Music students, a talk about the political environment of making music in Korea, and a lecture on international arts management to a total of 300 students.



#### **Achievements of** Women in Music: **Symphoria**

Syracuse's Symphoria presented a nearly sold-out concert, Achievements of Women in Music, highlighting the achievements of women in music and linked to the legacy and heritage of Central New York women in the fight to gain voting rights for women.



#### Taylor 2

The Paul Taylor Dance Company presented Taylor 2, six professional dancers whose mission is to perform his work throughout the world unhindered by economic or technical limitations. In addition to the performance and post-show discussion, the company hosted two masterclasses for SUNY Oswego students and an open rehearsal, with a total of 100 individuals in attendance.



#### **Beyond Sacred: Voices Of** Muslim Identity

Ping Chong & Company presented Beyond Sacred: Voices of Muslim Identity, a documentary theatre performance by five young Muslim Americans who come of age in a post 9/11 society. The company hosted

two performances, one

for the Oswego High School 10th Grade, and one open to the public on campus. In addition to the performances, the company hosted a creative writing workshop, and led two powerful post-


show discussions.



#### The Mystical Arts of Tibet

The Mystical Arts of Tibet held a week-long residency in Penfield Library that included the construction of a sand mandala, opening and closing ceremonies, and workshops on Tibetan practices of healing and wellness. Millions of grains of sand were painstakingly laid into place over a period of five days, creating traditional prescribed


iconography that included geometric shapes and a multitude of ancient spiritual symbols, used as a tool for re-consecrating the earth and its inhabitants. An estimated 2000 individuals visited the Library over the course of the residency to view the mandala and participate in related activities.



## Ke-nekt' Chamber Music Series

## **Jesus Castro**

Hailing from Cartagena, Colombia, flutist Jesus Castro traveled to campus and collaborated with SUNY Oswego faculty Robert Auler and Trevor Jorgensen to perform national and famous chamber music repertoire with some Colombian favorites.



**Dick Oatts** 

World renowned alto saxophonist Dick Oatts' traveled to Oswego to perform with the Oswego Jazz Project. In addition to the concert, Oatts' held a masterclass/workshop with students form Oswego High School, as well as two engagements with SUNY Oswego students studying improvisation and Jazz. The residency concluded with an additional concert collaboration with Oatts and students from the SUNY Oswego lazz Ensemble where I 20 audience members were in attendance.



In February, JR Fralick presented a lecture on 19th-Century Russian arias for tenor that traced the history of 19th-Century Russian opera including composertion, production, manuscript images and video segments of operatic productions. In addition to the evening lecture, Fralick held a masterclass/discussion with students in the Music Department.





## Masayo Ishigure

The last concert of the series featured Koto musician, Masayo Ishigure who performed both traditional and contemporary works, and explained the history of the instrument to audience members. The SUNY Oswego Women's Choir had the pleasure of rehearsing and performing two pieces with Ishigure during the evening concert as well.

# Campus Funded Projects

With funding from the Student Art Fee, ARTSwego administered approximately \$50,000 to 16 different campus arts projects for the 2018-19 Academic Year.

Combined, these projects consisted of 21 masterclasses and workshop, 15 public lectures and demonstrations, 6 public receptions, and 7 public performances and screenings.

Total attendance to funded programs was 2,457, with an additional 3,975 people attending funded exhibitions equaling a total overall attendance to funded programs at 6,432.
