The Procession

The procession begins with the entrance of the chair of the Faculty Assembly bearing the university mace, followed by the retiring faculty and professional staff, summa cum laude graduates leading the undergraduate candidates, graduate candidates, the emeriti faculty, and faculty led by marshals who escort them to special seating areas. When they have taken their places, the platform party enters. The officer in charge of the university concludes the procession wearing the university medallion.

Officer in Charge

Appointed Officer in Charge on January 1, 2022, Dr. Toale provides continuing leadership for the university, drawing on years of deep involvement in the advancement of high-level initiatives across the SUNY Oswego campus community. Toale's service includes many leadership roles since her arrival in 2014, including: Deputy to the President, Affirmative Action Officer, Campus safety monitor, liaison to the SUNY Employee Relations and General Counsel's Offices, co-officer-in-charge for Enrollment Management, acting vice president for Student Affairs, interim dean of Graduate Studies, chair of the Department of Communication Studies, graduate coordinator, and as a faculty fellow in the President's Office. Prior to joining SUNY Oswego, Toale held faculty positions at West Virginia Wesleyan College and Baldwin Wallace University. She earned her doctoral degree in instructional communication and master's degree in communication theory and research from West Virginia University and a bachelor's degree in secondary mathematics education from West Virginia Wesleyan College.



Victoria Furlong

Vice President for Administration and Finance

Furlong earned her promotion to become Oswego's first woman to serve as vice president of administration and finance in September 2021. Furlong began her career at SUNY Oswego over 25 years ago and has had progressive leadership experiences on campus. In all of her positions, Furlong has sought to create a welcoming and inclusive community for all. As SUNY Oswego's Chief Financial Officer, Furlong serves as a member of the President's Cabinet; oversees Facility Services, Human Resources, University Police, and the Finance and Budget Office. Furlong earned both her master of business administration and bachelor's in business administration from SUNY Oswego.



Mary Canale

Vice President for Development and Alumni Engagement

Canale came to Oswego in 1996 as the coordinator of the Oswego State Fall Classic, and successfully worked her way up to her current position as vice president for development and alumni engagement and executive director of the Oswego College Foundation — positions she has held since 2016. A 1981 alumna, Canale was integral to the success of both of the university's comprehensive fundraising campaigns as well as the Path Forward, Possibility and Marano Scholars programs and the naming of the James A. Triandiflou Institute for Equity, Diversity and Transformative Practice in 2022. Canale serves as the university's principal fundraiser and has helped to achieve unprecedented growth in the school's endowment, which consistently shows stronger returns than peers. She is a member of the Association of Fundraising Professionals and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education.



Scott Furlong

Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs and Enrollment Management

The university's chief academic and enrollment officer, Furlong, joined the Oswego family in July 2017. Furlong is responsible for leadership of all instructional and academic programs, overseeing more than 100 academic programs in the university's four schools with more than 550 faculty, as well as a range of academic support staff and offerings. In May 2022, he also added leadership for a holistic approach to enrollment management, admissions, financial aid and retention efforts. A renowned public policy scholar and co-author of two books, Furlong has led and championed efforts around student success, integrating the ideals of a liberal arts education into all curriculum, and facilitating activities that bridge curricular and co-curricular learning. He earned his bachelor of arts degree in government from St. Lawrence University, and his master of public administration and Ph.D. in political science from American University.



Kathleen Kerr

Vice President for Student Affairs

As Oswego's chief student affairs officer, Kerr serves on the President's Cabinet; oversees Auxiliary Services, Campus Life, Counseling Services, Health Services, Intercollegiate Athletics, Residence Life and Housing, Office of the Dean of Students, Campus Recreation, Student Orientation and Family Engagement, and Student Conduct; and spearheads developing a strategic vision for student affairs while strengthening cross-campus collaborations. Her team strives to advance student success, complement and supplement the learning that occurs inside the classroom and help engender student belongingness. She earned a doctorate of education in educational leadership from the University of Delaware; and both a master's degree in college student personnel administration and bachelor's degree in psychology from Indiana University.



Kendra Cadogan

Chief Diversity and Inclusion Officer

Cadogan, who joined SUNY Oswego in January 2022, leads the implementation of SUNY Oswego's strategic diversity and inclusion goals; serves as the interim director of the James A. Triandiflou '88 Institute for Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Transformative Practice; and contributes to continued cultivation, enhancement and promotion of an environment of equity and inclusion for all at SUNY Oswego. Cadogan previously served as the Senior Associate for Program and Policy Evaluation at the State University of New York. In this system administration role, she provided system-wide leadership for best practices related to recruiting and retaining diverse students through scholarship and fellowships initiatives. Cadogan also served as the Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at the University at Buffalo School of Law, where she developed a broad range of DEI-related programs and initiatives. She earned her master of education and bachelor of arts degrees in psychology and sociology from the University at Buffalo.

Deans of the University



Kristin Croyle

Dean, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

Prior to joining Oswego in July 2019, Croyle served as vice president for student success and professor of psychological sciences at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley. In the former role, she spearheaded retention and graduation initiatives, student educational outreach, academic advising and student academic supports, experiential learning initiatives and more. She was instrumental in shaping the student success structure, initiatives and staffing at the newly formed multi-campus university to build undergraduate student success on all campuses. Croyle's prior positions include vice provost for undergraduate education as well as dean of the University College at the University of Texas-Pan American. She received her doctor of philosophy and master of arts in clinical psychology from the University of Montana, and a bachelor of science in psychology from the University of Utah.



Kristen Eichhorn

Dean, Graduate Studies

Eichhorn was appointed dean in 2017 after serving the institution in several leadership roles, including Presidential Faculty Fellow, interim dean of extended learning, SUNY Faculty Senator and communication studies chair. Eichhorn was an American Council On Education Fellow in 2016-17, spending a year in Cornell University's Office of Provost. Eichhorn has a distinguished record of teaching and research and her publications include co-authoring the "Interpersonal Communication: Building Rewarding Relationships" textbook and research papers in multiple international journals. She earned her bachelor's degree from Canisius College, master's from West Virginia University and Ph.D. in communication from the University of Miami.



Jennifer Knapp

Interim Dean, School of Communication, Media and the Arts

Named interim dean in June 2022 after serving as associate dean, Knapp has significant administrative and teaching experience since joining Oswego in 2008. As associate dean, she was at the forefront of the rollout of the new Academic Probation policy, and helped training advisors while working directly with students. She has also been the point person for new adjunct orientation, organizing participants from across campus and building professional relationships. She also chaired the Assessment Advisory Committee for five years, chaired the Communication Studies Department and was twice interim department chair of Theatre. Knapp is proud to have led a team in the development of the new higher education leadership master's program. She earned her Ed.D. in educational psychology and master's in communication studies from West Virginia University and a bachelor's in communication studies from Canisius College.



Prabakar Kothandaraman

Dean, School of Business

Assuming the role as dean in July 2019, Kothandaraman previously served as chair and professor of professional sales in the Cotsakos College of Business at William Paterson University, and executive director of the Russ Berrie Institute for Professional Sales. He spearheaded rolling out the college's first-ever master's degree in sales leadership; assembled the Russ Berrie Institute's advisory board and graduate program advisory board; excelled in corporate sponsorships and external training revenue; and increased corporate engagement through student-centric events leading to job placement. Kothandaraman previously taught at Drexel, Texas A&M and Xavier Institute of Management in Bhubaneswar, India. He received his doctorate in business administration from Pennsylvania State University's Smeal College of Business, an MBA from the Xavier Institute of Management and a B.E. in chemical engineering from the Birla Institute of Technology and Science in India.



Jill Pippin

Dean, Extended Learning

Before joining Oswego in January 2014, Pippin served for eight years as dean for continuing education at Jefferson Community College. Her career has spanned both academic and business positions such as director for graduate services and enrollment, adjunct business instructor, director of operations and major accounts manager. Experience in these roles and as an adult student, earning an MBA from Franklin University, has instilled a passion for providing access to higher education at all levels of the educational ecosystem. Previously, the Oswego alumna with a bachelor's in communication studies led enrollment management and student services for graduate students at Franklin University, developed the Jefferson Higher Education Center, facilitated significant growth of Jefferson's military services on Fort Drum and established other innovative and community-oriented programs for adult and non-traditional students. In 2013, she earned the Continuing Education Association of New York's Outstanding Continuing Educator Award.



Laura Spenceley

Dean, School of Education

Named dean in May 2022, Spenceley previously served as interim dean of the School of Education, associate dean of graduate studies and associate professor of counseling and psychological services. She received her Ph.D. from Syracuse University before joining Oswego in 2012. Spenceley has chaired the School of Education Faculty Council and been active in accreditation and assessment processes, while working to remove barriers to success for students. She has been a critical member of the Graduate Studies Division working in areas of enrollment, policy development and student success. She has served on a range of department, school and college-wide committees, and is highly engaged with the campus.

Cameron Jones '09

Manager of Development for Integrated Content Strategy for ABC News Studios

A winner of multiple Emmy Awards, Jones currently coordinates inclusive content development activities for ABC News to support the greenlight process in development of show ideas generated internally and from third-party producers. He works across a multiplatform content space developing and supporting treatments for longform narrative non-fiction special projects, multi-part series and docu-series.

He previously served in a chief-of-staff role for the Office of the President for ABC News. In this role, Jones reported to the president of ABC News and was a strategic partner on daily operations, special assignments and business for the news division. Jones also broadened his experience while working in project management for The Walt Disney Company's Direct-to-Consumer and International subsidiary. He supported advertising sales operations for Disney Media properties, for the first-ever Disney Media Upfront in 2019. Jones is passionate about people and storytelling with a mix of creativity, curiosity and entrepreneurship.

Previously, he worked as a contributing digital entertainment reporter for ABC News Digital and operations coordinator for ABC News Good Morning America. He was on the front lines behind the scenes at Good Morning America helping to produce live events and segments as well as other administrative duties, including day-to-day business functions.

Jones also spent his time in front of the camera conducting one-on-one interviews, live streams and digital video content that has included notables like Oprah Winfrey, LeAnn Rimes, Kelly Rowland, Raven-Symoné, Candace Cameron Bure and more.

In December 2013, ABC News honored Cameron as a Most Valuable Player for outstanding work. He also has earned a Graduate of the Last Decade award from SUNY Oswego.

During his time at SUNY Oswego, Jones was a member of the Future Alumni Network, National Association of Black Journalists, Phi Beta Sigma and among the first class of Oswego student bloggers. Jones also interned at WSTM/CNYCentral in Syracuse.

He remains very active with his alma mater, having participated in the university's Alumni-In-Residence program and New York City Career Connections; served on the Graduates Of the Last Decade Leadership Council and as a Career Connector for the Dr. Lewis B. O'Donnell Media Summit; and donated regularly to *The Fund for Oswego*.

In addition to his Oswego degree, Jones earned his master's degree in business administration from Syracuse University with a specialization in entrepreneurship.

Yahya Ibrahima Ndiaye '22

College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

An international student from Dakar, Senegal, Ndiaye is graduating with a bachelor's in electrical and computer engineering and in French studies. During his time on campus, he was an orientation leader, tour guide and intern with the Office of Admissions, a tutor for his majors, a teaching assistant for the French program, a student technician for the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department and president of both the Muslim Students Association and the Robotics Club. Over the past year, Ndiaye worked as an electrical and instrumentation intern at the African Refining Company in Senegal. He also was a process automation engineering intern with Freeport-Mcmoran, the biggest mining site in North America, located in Morenci, Arizona, where he will work following graduation. Ndiaye plans to pursue a career in industrial automation while attaining a master's degree and Ph.D., before returning to Senegal to make an impact on his community.

Academic Traditions

The Commencement Setting — The 2007 ceremonies marked the first graduations to take place in what is now known as the Deborah F. Stanley Arena and Convocation Hall within Marano Campus Center. Located in the heart of campus, the Marano Campus Center represents the university’s social hub and a gathering place for events appealing to a wide range of student, faculty and community interests. This \$25.5 million building was the first new construction on our lakeside campus in 35 years when it opened in the fall of 2006.

The Academic Procession — The centuries-old pageantry of the academic procession dates from ancient traditions rooted in the early universities. Since the clergy were in charge of the first academic ceremonies, they followed the familiar order of religious processions.

The Tradition of Academic Attire — Caps, gowns and hoods worn at college and university functions date from the Middle Ages. Monks and students of that time wore them to keep warm in the damp, drafty halls of learning. From these practical origins they have developed into the accepted garb which symbolizes scholarly achievement.

Baccalaureate gowns have a long, pleated front with shirring across the shoulders and back. They are primarily distinguished by flowing sleeves pointed at the fingertips. These gowns may be worn open or closed.

The master’s gown is worn open and the sleeve is cut so that the forearm comes through a slit just above the elbow. The lining of the hood is satin and the color represents the school conferring the degree. The velvet border color represents the discipline in which the degree was earned.

Doctoral gowns are traditionally worn open, but either open or closed is acceptable. They carry broad, velvet panels down the front and three velvet bars on the full, round sleeves. This velvet trimming may be either black or the color distinctive of the degree. Mortarboards or caps worn with baccalaureate and master’s gowns generally have black tassels. The tassel of the doctoral cap is usually made of gold bullion.

The doctoral hood gives color and meaning to the academic costume. Its silk lining bears the color of the institution conferring the degree. The hood is bordered with velvet of a prescribed width and color to indicate the field of learning to which the degree pertains.

Honor Cords for Military Service — United States veterans and reserve and active duty military graduating from SUNY Oswego are wearing red, white and blue honor cords in recognition of their service.

The University Medallion is worn by the SUNY Oswego officer in charge as a symbol of authority at all official ceremonies such as Commencement and Honors Convocation. Oswego is represented in the perfect center of the medallion by a tiny green and gold circle. The dot is located properly on an outline of New York state, which itself surmounts a globe to show the relationship of our institution to the state and the world. Fashioned by Dominic T. DiPasquale of the Art Department for president James Perdue’s 1966 inauguration, the medallion was a gift of the Class of 1966 for the occasion.

A wreath of gold leaves surrounds the globe and is circled by a flat band bearing the engraved university name and two dates: 1861, the university founding; and 1948, the founding of the State University of which Oswego was a charter unit. On the clasp above the medallion sits a gold lamp of knowledge, emblematic of a seat of learning. (Photo, page 1.)

The University Mace — In medieval times the mace was a weapon of offense with the metal head often heavily spiked. Today it appears chiefly in ceremonial functions of churches, governments, colleges and universities. The head of the Oswego mace holds a jade sphere symbolizing the university of wisdom and knowledge, surrounded by four silver flanges unfolding petal-like without imprisoning the sphere and representing the potential of disciplined imagination, the goal of higher education. The richness of the jade and the rosewood shaft reflect the pomp and solemnity of academic ceremony.

A gift of the Class of 1969 for President James Perdue’s inauguration, the Oswego mace has been in use at Commencement ever since. Joseph F. Shoenfelt of the art faculty created its design and silver work, with the rosewood turning by William D. Todd, formerly of the technology faculty. (Photo, page 15.)

Beta Gamma Sigma International Business Honor Society for AACSB Accredited Schools—serving business programs accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

Chi Alpha Epsilon Educational Opportunity Program Honor Society—recognizes the academic achievements of students admitted to colleges and universities through non-traditional criteria and serves EOP students. Promotes continued high academic standards, fosters increased communication among its members, and honors academic excellence achieved by those students.

Chi Sigma Iota International Honor Society of Professional Counseling and for Professional Counselors—established in 1985 to provide recognition for outstanding achievement and service within the profession by counselors-in-training, counselor educators, and professional counselors whose career commitment is to research and serve through professional counseling.

Delta Phi Alpha German Honor Society—recognizes excellence in the study of German; promotes higher scholarship and study of German language, literature and civilization; emphasizing aspects of German life and the culture of universal value contributing to the eternal search for peace and truth.

Epsilon Pi Tau International Honor Society for Professions in Technology—membership based on high scholastic attainment, participation and leadership in Technology in the university and in the community, and professional qualifications and promise.

Epsilon Upsilon Eta Sigma Gamma National Health Honorary Society—Established in 1967 is an honorary for health education known for its rich history of serving students and the health profession through teaching, service, and research.

Gamma Kappa Alpha National Italian Honor Society—formed to acknowledge superior scholastic performance in the field of Italian language, literature and culture, and is open to membership at institutions of higher learning in the United States and Canada. The society encourages college students to acquire a greater interest in, and a deeper understanding of, Italian culture, art and history.

Kappa Delta Pi National Education Honor Society—recognizes excellence and fosters mutual cooperation, support and professional growth for educational professionals.

Lambda Alpha Anthropology Honor Society—promotes scholarship and research in anthropology by recognizing and honoring superior achievement in the discipline among students, faculty and other persons engaged in the study of anthropology.
