Enrollment Update - Cont'd.

ACE at SUNY Oswego

- Advancing Completion through Engagement
- ASAP at 2-year campuses, ACE at 4-year campuses
- Replication of CUNY support program at 25 campuses using SUNY Transformational Funds
- Additional layer of support for students who are at risk of dropping out of college
- Provides Academic, Career, and Financial support
- Pays at-risk students in the program to participate
- Initial cohort this spring, with the goal of 150 for Fall

Central New York Transfer Collaboration

- Partnership between SUNY Oswego, Cayuga, Jefferson, and Onondaga Community Colleges.
- Goal of increasing seamless transfer by better aligning curriculum to reduce credit duplication and time to degree.
- Support reverse transfer--provide a smooth transfer process for students who are academically dismissed back to community college, with the goal of them returning after a semester or two.


- College-level Fall-to-Spring Retention dashboard

- Each dean conducting deeper dives





COLLEGE DASHBOARD: Percent of New Undergraduates Completing First Fall Term on Academic Probation
















Retention Initiatives - Cont'd.

Inspiring academic experiences/Great Teaching

In place:

- CELT development on inclusive teaching and other empirically supported pedagogies
- ACUE faculty development (boosting with Title III)
- Integration of HIPs into all majors for all students (internships, research experiences and capstone)
- Small classes
- Involvement in academic clubs/events such as Launch It (Prabakar)

In pilot/growing:

- Course redesign in areas of concern for pass rates (boosting with Title III) (Kristin)
- Internship impact fund (Michelle)
- Embedding career/NACE goals into coursework to better engage and prepare career-oriented students

In idea/exploration phase:

- Building connections with majors earlier through stacked classes (Jen)
- Course structure modifications for challenging high-enrollment courses like CS 212



Retention Initiatives - Cont'd.

Belongingness and Supportive Relationships

In place:

- Student organizations advised by faculty and staff, connected to majors/departments
- CSTEP, EOP, and TOC (both community-building and mentoring)
- GST 104
- Grad Office boot camp for first-gen and other students through the application and enrollment phases (Kristen)
- Penfield belongingness initiatives (Sarah)
- Focused support for adult online students including ASAP and other programming (Jill)
- Leadership/faculty involved in orientation to support college experience, connect with people in the departments, and build an early sense of belonging and engagement - (Laura)
- Regular input from students in the colleges/schools through student advisory groups and listening sessions

In pilot/growing:

Peer mentoring within programs

In idea/exploration phase:

First-year student mentoring from near peers - (Prabakar)

Strong Networks of Support

In place:

- Advising structure (both Academic Advising Office and Programmatic Advising) (Laura)
- Intensive academic probation advising with faculty to help students get back on track (Rameen)
- Mid-term grade reporting and outreach from advisors
- Tutoring and embedded tutoring (boosting with Title III)
- Starfish
- CSTEP, EOP, and TOC
- Many holistic supports from Student Affairs

Strengthening Student Support Services

Basic Needs

- Expansion of Mental Health Resources for students through SUNY Transformation Funds.
- Chancellor King's recent visit to our campus amplified funding for student wellness and wellbeing.
- Expansion of Services for students with food and housing needs.
- Expanded Network of Care (e.g., use of Starfish and Early warning system utilizing Resident Assistants and Supervisors)

Post Admission – Pre-Matriculation Initiatives

- Expansion of the **Laker Navigators program** Upper division students trained to assist newly admitted students with the University on-boarding process.
- **START** (Strengthening Transition and Academic Readiness for Tomorrow) peer mentors These peer mentors will be working directly with ACE program students in their General Studies (GST) class in Fall 2024.
